

Owen credits his parents and school support network for encouraging him to continue to strive for strong grades while recognizing that a non-traditional path would allow him to pursue his acting interest as well. Owen says that to be successful he knows that his acting hobby-turned-career needs to be his number one focus, before anything else. He still works really hard in school but looks at things through a different lens knowing what his ultimate goals are.

When he was younger, Owen wasn't a fan of the audition process due to the frequency and time-commitment required for them. However, now that he has had the opportunity to work on set and experience the best parts of the acting process, he sees auditions as a means to an end, or part of the process to get to the "good stuff." Additionally, he now appreciates that auditions allow him the opportunity to explore different scripts, looking for ones he really enjoys. As his acting experiences have grown, he truly has developed an appreciation for all aspects of the process. When asked if all of the time and dedication he has to give to his acting career took any of the fun away Owen said "when you love every aspect of it, you are willing to commit to every aspect of it."

Owen had his first "big" role in the movie *Diary of a Wimpy Kid*, which exposed him to a more invested, big-screen level of acting. After that role, the question begged "now what?" He did express a desire to come back to school as he was getting older and felt he could manage the demands of both acting and academics and returned to the JSHS in 8th grade. While he was still pursuing acting roles, he appreciated being back at school with his classmates and was focused on getting good grades. Despite a three-year absence from in-person school at Wyomissing Area, he still knew everyone and acclimated to the school climate very quickly.

Such an amazing opportunity was tricky for Owen not to talk about at school with his teachers, but he couldn't share the details until he completed the full audition process. Such a major accomplishment and career milestone certainly took a lot of effort and dedication from Owen, but he also recognizes the value of the support he received from his family and the school. his 9th-grade year in order to film the movie. The school and his family's support and flexibility helped him successfully finish the year academically while taking these next steps in his career.

JSHS Teachers Focus on Skills for Success
To maximize the amount of in-school face-to-face instruction for students while implementing health and safety measures to prevent the spread of Covid-19, Wyomissing Area adopted a hybrid schedule to begin the 2020 school year. With some students attending school in a fully virtual setting and most students attending school in-person for 2 days a week, the high school administration acknowledged the need for specific skill-based training. For the first week of the school year teachers were assigned the task of educating their students on specific "soft skills." Encouraged and guided by assistant principal Mrs. Ginger Johnson, teachers worked together to address the social and emotional needs of students due to this year's unique schedule. The soft skills focused on technology, stress management, and the social skills students needed to utilize in order to stay focused and successful during these trying times. Students were taught how to write proper emails, about online citizenship, time management, and how to manage stress throughout the hybrid schedule. Mrs. Johnson wants to remind Wyomissing Area students that it is important to remain mindful during this time and to adopt the skills taught to them at the beginning of the year. It is important to remember that we are all in this together and there is always someone to reach out to if you are in need.
Spartans in Action: 3D-Printed Microscopes



Mrs. Bogert, who teaches different levels of science at the Junior-Senior High School, is currently working with the high school's engineering class and Dr. Liskey to create 3D printed microscopes! Faced with the dilemma of shared equipment for science labs this year and our current health and safety protocols, it was time to get creative about how students could still get the most out of their science classes while maintaining safe practices and minimal contact. Mrs. Bogert and Dr. Liskey put their ideas together and developed a plan for individual students to have personal 3D-printed microscopes that function with their own phones. One of the greatest benefits of the microscopes is their portability— environmental science students will be able to take their microscopes outside for direct learning with the outdoors and all students will be able to take them home, too!

Currently, the high school engineering class has two microscope prototypes. The first prototype consists of a stand that a student's phone can rest upon, while the second prototype involves a microscope that can attach to a student's phone at its camera. Because the students have a variety of different phones, every microscope will be personalized to their phone models. Mrs. Bogert has already recorded her students' phone types, generations, and styles.

This collaborative learning experience benefits so many Spartans! Science students will benefit from having personal microscopes, and the engineering students are also receiving a special opportunity to work with a real-world problem and to apply their skills. Unlike many class projects, the engineering students' final product will impact the science classes in our school and the learning experiences of fellow classmates. The engineering class is working their hardest to make the best 3D-printed microscopes possible and we are so excited by this wonderful partnership and project!

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Special Spartan Spotlight: JSHS Theater Arts Partners with WHEC			





During the spring school closure, Miss Tierney, Mrs. Johnson, and Mr. Siggins at the JSHS partnered with teachers across the District to host weekly "Tuesday Tales" stories; these weekly stories raised the spirits of our students at home and reconnected our district community in a creative way. Mr. Krick, the high school theatre arts teacher, saw the impact of these stories and wanted to find a way to incorporate them into his class. After working with the WHEC staff and exploring their curriculum, they decided on a list of books that are present throughout the content covered in grades K-4, anywhere from Dr. Seuss to Jan Brett. With the adjusted school schedule this year, the Wyomissing Area staff has been looking for new and exciting ways to engage students in their course material both at home and in school. To make these stories a little more interactive for our students, Mr. Krick's theater arts class has put their acting knowledge to use by recording themselves reading these books to be used as a component of the WHEC curriculum. High school theater students are using these books as an opportunity to explore the different ways to act out a story, read in different styles, and add their own touch to someone else's work. Just as each book is unique, each actor is adding their own unique touch to the story by exploring different acting styles and interpretations. With a little help from Mr. Krick, these students recorded dozens of book readings to be used throughout the year at WHEC, helping our younger students understand their readings and giving them a fun, unique learning experience. Updates from the PTA



Special Spartan Accomplishments: 1918 by Mr. Joseph Allen






The teachers at Wyomissing Area continue to impress us with their talents each and every day. Mr. Joseph Allen is one of our dedicated history teachers and track coaches at the JSHS and he decided to share his love for history and education with those beyond our school through his new book, 1918. 1918 takes place during the outbreak of the Spanish Influenza, through the perspective of an 18-year-old boy who now faces the risk of getting drafted to serve in World War I. He struggles to accept this new reality and must learn to overcome the challenges that he must face along with it, as well as the challenges the entire country must face as well.

With the recent outbreak of the Covid-19 virus, Mr. Allen connected this story to the present day, reflecting on what he witnessed during this time of distress. Over the course of the past seven months, people have begun to panic, not sure how to react to such unknown times. He hopes that through 1918, he can help his readers cope with these reactions to the pandemic through the perspective of a boy in a similar situation in history during the outbreak of the Spanish Influenza. Perhaps seeing how society overcame disease in the past would bring guidance to those struggling now. In addition, writing 1918 helped Mr. Allen himself cope with the trying times, finding ways to accept the fact that the spring track season was canceled, one that he and his daughter, 2020 graduate Caroline Allen, had been looking forward to and had high hopes for. Writing this book was Mr. Allen's form of therapy, and, lucky for us, as his readers, we get to be a part of his journey in overcoming this challenge.

If there is anything Mr. Allen wishes his readers will take away from 1918, it is his hope that "it becomes helpful to anyone who needs to see there is always a light at the end of the tunnel," and that they will better understand what the people who came before us endured, as well as the sacrifices they have made. He feels our connection to history makes us who we are today, a realization we can come to by reading 1918. Mr. Allen just finished writing a trilogy and hopes to write more in the new year. 
The Charten Football Drogram.	A Football Family	



Since the founding of Wyomissing Area's football program in 1944, the sport has been a source of pride and tradition in the Wyomissing and West Reading communities. Over the last year, Wyomissing natives Pete Beck and Frank Ferrandino, have embarked on a journey to document the past 75 years of football in this community. Both Beck and Ferrandino attended Wyomissing Area High School as students and continue to work at the JSHS and live in the community today. As the District's athletic director, Frank Ferrandino has seen the inner-workings of the Wyomissing Area football program since he started in the position in 2013; however, his involvement dates back to the mid-'80s when he was a player himself. According to Ferrandino, his time spent on the team as a player and coach was one of the main motivations for writing the book. He explained how "[he has] gotten so much out of the program as a player and a coach, and [he] wanted a special way to give back to the community." While Pete Beck was not a player on the team, he's been a faithful fan of Wyomissing Area football since 1990 and can often be spotted on the sideline of Saturday games as part of the "Chain Gang".

A Football Family highlights a wide range of players, teams, and special moments that have contributed to the rich tradition of Wyomissing Area football. 75 years of previous seasons are represented through pictures, game scores, and major season highlights. The book delves into details of the top ten games in school history, traditions within the program, championship team highlights, and of course details regarding the 2012 State Championship team. Excitement is high in anticipation of the book's release, and many people within the community who were members of a team are excited to reflect on their days as a Wyomissing Area Spartan. Current players are also excited to look back at the teams that paved the way for today's program. Senior running back, Evan Neidrowski, says, "It will be exciting to learn more about the teams that so many of my coaches and teachers played on when they were students at Wyomissing." One of this year's football captains, Darren Brunner, stated, "It's interesting to see how the program has evolved over the years until now."

Frank Ferrandino wanted to write this book for years, and in August of 2019, he and Pete Beck finally decided to make the dream a reality. Both Ferrandino and Beck want to acknowledge that this project would not have been possible without their partnership and support from the Wyomissing Area community. The two embarked on this long journey together 14 months ago, and are both extremely proud of the outcome. With the holiday season approaching, the book will make a great gift for any former player, parent, or fan of the Wyomissing Area football program.
