## Science Day Turns into STEAM Extravaganza

In 2015, Science Day grew into the STEAM Extravaganza, providing more options for teachers as they planned activities. At WHEC, students spent the day on May 18, engaged in science, technology and math activities through four rotations within their grade levels. This year's assembly, presented by the Franklin Institute, focused on the physics of hot and cold and kept students engaged and excited throughout the presentation.

Under the guidance of Mr. Minich and Mr. Siggins, twenty-six high school students spent part of the day helping make the STEAM Extravaganza a success. Some students assisted teachers in the classroom, while others talked about science and technology opportunities at the high school. They demonstrated various tech-

nology-based projects, such as 3-D printers and quad copters.##

It was all about science for the fifth and sixth grade students on May 22. In fifth grade, students rotated from room to room doing a variety of experiments or design competitions. The topics had a wide range of challenges: from pH testing to building towers out of spaghetti, exercising to learn about fitness, making a watercraft to hold pennies, crafting a polymer (Silly Wyo Putty), and building a ping pong ball carrier. Eighth grade assistants helped students achieve their science goals. In sixth grade, students were treated to the science of color, optical illusions, magic of math, health and fitness activities as well as having their names written in the stars! Many more engaging activities and challenges were presented

throughout the day.

Each grade level attended an assembly on chemistry experiments moderated by Mr. Joe Kollar and demonstrated by some of his AP chemistry students. There is no doubt that there was an "explosion" of energy, and high interest for the wonder of science!

## McNichol Honored with Annie Sullivan Award



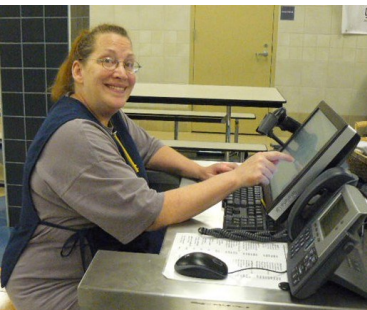
Sallyanne McNichol displays her award with Jessica Lengle who nominated her.

## In Memoriam

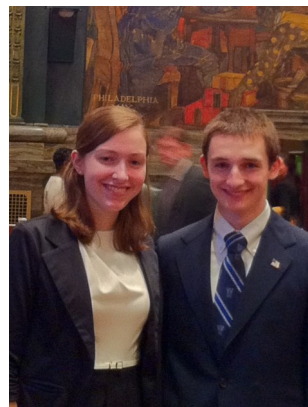

## New Clearance Requirements for Volunteers

Due to recent legislative changes in Pennsylvania the Child Protective Services (CPSL) has been amended necessitating school districts to update policies and procedures to comply.

The law now requires all school employees, contractors, and volunteers having direct contact with children to obtain new clearances (child abuse history clearance and state and federal criminal history checks) every 36 months.

Effective December 31, 2014, new volunteers must have clearances in order to be approved for

their positions. Effective July 1, 2015, existing volunteers who do not already have clearances and those volunteers with clearance that will be more than three years old must obtain the required clearances.

For purposes of the CPSL clearance requirements, a volunteer is an adult serving in an unpaid position in which they are individually responsible for the welfare of a child or have direct contact with children (care, supervision, guidance or control of children, or routine interaction with children.

If a volunteer has continuously resided in Pennsylvania for 10 years AND swears in writing that he or she has never been convicted of a disqualifying crime in Pennsylvania, or the corresponding offenses under the laws of any other jurisdiction, the volunteer only needs the Pennsylvania Child Abuse History Clearance and the state criminal history check; the federal check is not needed.
