

#### Meet the Teacher at Open House!





The after-school program will provide a structured environment for students while their parents are still at work. Jamie Chimelewski will take on the role of the Site Director and said, "I am thrilled to be able to bring to the table my many years of experience working with and advocating for the youth of our community. I believe that through Olivet's partnership with the Wyomissing Area School District, my team and I will be able to make a lasting, meaningful impact on the lives of those whom we serve." Principal of the West Reading Elementary Center Dr. Babb stated, "I am very excited to be partnering with the Olivet Boys' and Girls' Club to enhance our after-school programming at WREC. We have the opportunity to pilot a new Olivet programming model that involves a great degree of collaboration between the WREC staff and our partners from Olivet. Our students are really going to benefit from it."

Our teachers' literature-rich classroom environments and huge selection of diverse texts help our WHEC readers and writers develop independence. We are certainly enjoying reading, discussing, and developing our love of literature in every WHEC classroom!

#### **Wyomissing Area Participates in Science Research Institute**

The Wyomissing Area School District prides itself on the ways our staff and students get involved in our community and our partnership with the Science Research Institute (SRI) at Albright College is continuing to create new opportunities for staff and students alike. In recent years, Wyomissing Area teacher Dr. Brian Liskey has worked with the Science Research Institute providing him an opportunity to share his love of science with students by bringing science into the real world. With Dr. Liskey's guidance, Wyomissing Area students' most recent involvement with SRI has been participating in research on the Susquehanna River to detect water quality issues. Over the summer, the watershed research team worked with the EPA and the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission to study the impact of invasive species, specifically the snakehead, on the river's water quality. Invasive species like the snakehead are detrimental to native ecosystems because they have little to no natural predators and out-compete the native fish species. While working with the watershed team, Dr. Liskey and his students used a technique called QPCR to see if the snakehead DNA was present in regions of the Susquehanna River. By detecting if the snakehead's DNA was present, the team could assess where in the river the invasive species was located. Interesting enough, this is the same technology used to detect the COVID-19 virus. Dr. Liskey is excited to continue his involvement with the SRI program and hopes to give more Wyomissing Area students the ability to research the many fields of science through this partnership.

In addition to the hands-on science exploration and research opportunities this program provides for students, Wyomissing Area is fortunate to offer a professional learning experience to a group of faculty members as part of this partnership, as well. This Total Experience Learning (TEL) offers dynamic learning opportunities for WASD educators to impact instructional practice and student engagement and we are thrilled to have participation from faculty members across the district. Participants of this program will complete courses over the next twelve months which will culminate in a summer internship at the Science Research Institute at Albright College next summer. Additionally, our faculty participants will earn a certificate in Educational Innovation and Entrepreneurship. We are excited to grow our instructional practices in support of all students.

#### **Introducing the Wyomissing Area Hope Squad**



This year, the Wyomissing Area School District is excited to develop a Hope Squad. The mission of the Hope Squad is to reduce youth suicide through education, training, and peer intervention. The Hope Squad will help train students and staff to recognize warning signs in others, will seek to build positive relationships among peers and faculty, and will work to promote a positive school culture surrounding mental health. This peer-to-peer program is aimed to empower students and will be advised by Dr. Woodard, Mrs. Quinlivan, and Mrs. Godek. Dr. Woodard shares that "the Wyomissing Area School District is the second school in Pennsylvania to develop the Hope Squad and we are grateful for the Cook Center's grant funding and research-based curriculum to guide this work". The Jr./Sr. High School Continues Partnership with Morgan Corporation



Students in their senior year at Wyomissing Area and Wilson High School have the opportunity to participate in a welding internship program at Morgan Corporation in Morgantown, PA. Morgan Corporation is a national company that supplies truck bodies all across the United States. This internship allows students to get a head start on a possible career path post-graduation and can help them explore what they may want to do after high school. Wyomissing Area currently has two students participating in this program and is excited to see more students get involved in the future. Students in the program begin their day and coursework with traditional classes at the Jr./Sr. High School and are dismissed to Morgan Corporation for their afternoon class time before returning to school for end-of-day dismissal. The first few weeks spent at the facility include training sessions and classroom learning, as there is a lot of new information for students to learn. Additionally, students participate in a series of hands-on training activities, qualifying tests, and various screenings before they are allowed to begin on the work floor. Once they pass the initial training, they can begin completing welding tasks and are mentored by professionals at Morgan Corporation. Participating students earn high school credit through this program but also gain professional skills and experience. Even better, students that perform well in the program may have the opportunity to continue employment with Morgan Corporation after graduation! Wyomissing Area is proud to offer this unique and valuable opportunity to our Spartans allowing them to develop valuable skills and prepare to enter the workforce.

#### **Wyomissing Area Spartans Participate in ROTC Program**



Taking advantage of community ties and building relationships between schools, Wyomissing Area is fortunate to partner with Wilson School District to provide Wyomissing Area students the opportunity to participate in the JROTC program at Wilson High School. This partnership allows Wyomissing Area students the opportunity to step outside of their comfort zone and experience new opportunities through the program. Currently, there are seven students from Wyomissing Area that participate in the JROTC program. The students travel to Wilson High School for the beginning portion of the school day to participate and resume their traditional coursework at Wyomissing Area when they return mid-morning. Utilizing elective spaces in student schedules allows for the flexibility to provide this program.

The JROTC program is designed to teach high school students the value of citizenship, leadership, service to the community, personal responsibility, and a sense of self-esteem, accomplishment, teamwork, and self-discipline. Students at Wyomissing Area have chosen to do this program for many of these reasons. Harper Ostrich, a ninth-grade student, says "I chose to do JROTC for many reasons, but more specifically, because I grew up watching my father work in the Air Force. I wanted to bring citizens in our small community and beyond a better sense and representation of patriotism." While the JROTC program can help prepare students for a career in the military, it also does so much more. Wyomissing Area student Tad Sincavage states: "I've been able to meet so many new people that I wouldn't have met without JROTC. The first sergeant and major are amazing people and are willing to help us with anything."

The partnership with Wilson School District has allowed Wyomissing Area students the opportunity to join a valuable program that would not be available to them otherwise. We are thankful that students get to meet new people, learn from new teachers, and experience a new and unique learning environment. The JROTC program is something the students take pride in participating in and we are excited to see this opportunity grow.
