Public Art on West Reading Playground Fence Uses Poetry as Inspiration

This spring, the WREC playground will become the sight of a new and innovative public art project. This school-wide project will involve all WREC students in its creation, and

will be inspired by a poetry unit of the sixth grade Language Arts classes. The students will design and create a work of public art for the west side of the WREC playground fence (the side facing 5th Avenue). Inspiration for this work comes from the term Yarn Bomb, a street art that employs colorful displays of knitted or crocheted yarn or fiber rather than paint or chalk. The subject matter for this work of art will feature a design made entirely of text. The design will be made of plastic varn (plarn) and other weather-proof materials and

will remain on display for about one month. The chain link fence will act as an armature to support the various materials used in the project.

The text for this project will be the result of an artist/poet in residence. Berks County Poet Laureate Craig Czury, author of 20 books of poetry, earned his M.F.A. degree in Creative Writing from Wilkes University. A rostered artist with the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts since 1984, Craig has been creating poetry performances and poetry environments in schools, community centers. homeless and women's shelters. prisons and mental hospitals all over the world. Mr. Czury will be in residence at WREC for about three days.

Following Mr. Czury's residency, the various components of this project will be created in Language Arts and Art classes over the winter

months. In addition to the curricular ties with Language Arts and art, math skills are also used as the layout and planning for the design involves scale drawings and plotting the image using the grid of the chain link fence. The project will be installed in the playground in May. A reception will be held to celebrate the completed work with parents and the community at that time. The project will remain in place until after Art on the Avenue in mid-June when it will be dismantled with the help of community volunteers.

Welcome to the WHEC Book Room!

Students at WHEC are reading more than ever thanks to the addition of a new K-2 book room and improvements to the third and fourth grade book room.

The K-2 book room is conveniently located in the Reading Suite and provides a variety of leveled books for teachers to use as a resource in their classrooms. Students read these books during guided reading lessons, as well as during the literacy block. This year in our K-2 classrooms, Daily 5 literacy centers are being implemented during our literacy block time. In one of these centers, "Read to Self," students read books from their individual book boxes in order to improve reading stamina and fluency.

The third and fourth grade book room is located next to the library and contains many new and interesting novels. These novels are used for author studies, literature circles and Reader's Workshop. During Reader's Workshop, stu-



A REMINDER TO RESIDENTS

YOUR LOCAL EARNED INCOME TAX RETURN FOR 2013 MUST BE FILED BY APRIL 15, 2014.

Anyone, who has earned income, regardless of age, for the year 2013, must file a tax return if they lived in the Wyomissing Area School District. Even if your employer has withheld and paid your tax, this return must be completed. This obligation is incurred by anyone who is a wage earner, farmer, unincorporated business (including partnership and individual proprietorship) and ALL OTHERS who received earned income or profits for services rendered.

Failure to file on time will result in a penalty and interest charge of 12% per annum and additional costs of collection. Regulations also provide for a \$500 fine for refusal to file.

Residents of the Wyomissing Area School District are required to file a tax return, EVEN IF THEY HAVE **NOT RECEIVED A FORM THROUGH THE MAIL. Spelling Bee

On January 27, 2014 the 34th Annual Wyomissing Area – Reading Eagle Company Spelling Bee was held. The top six spellers in grades 6, 7 & 8 competed on the Jr./Sr. High stage in front of their peers, family and staff. Eighth grader Christopher Poon was the overall champion and sixth grader Caroline **Allen** finished second. The winning word was nucleolus. This marked the second championship finish for Poon; he won as a sixth grader in 2012. Both spellers from the competition will advance to the Berks County Championship Spelling Bee on Monday, March 10, at 7:00 p.m. in the Miller Center for the Arts at Reading Area Community College.

You Be the Chemist

For the first time ever, students from Wyomissing Area Jr/Sr High School participated in the Berks County You be the **Chemist** Challenge. The county competition was held on Saturday, February 8, at Penn State University Berks Campus. Wyomissing began preparation for this competition in November, when representatives from Brenntag Noth America, the sponsor of the Berks You be the Chemist Challenge, reached out to Wyomissing administration. Andrea Landrum and Mary Kate Bogert took on the responsibility of organizing this program for our 7th and 8th grade students.

Once word spread throughout the Junior High, 25 students expressed interest and attended several organizational meetings. The purpose of these meetings was to explain the format of the competition. Students were provided with a study packet, issued by the challenge creators themselves, which outlines the content students are to know for the competition. Essentially, students study the packet and are challenged with multiple-choice questions drawn from the information in the packet. While most of the studying was completed independently at home, students were also given the opportunity to stay after school every Thursday with Mrs. Bogert to study with peers, as well as ask her questions and receive her science support.

Due to the large number of interested schools and students, we were limited to 10 seats at the Berks County competition. A qualifying exam was administered to determine the top 10 performers to be taken to the competition. These students were: 8th

graders Sam Botterbusch, Tobias Walker, Andrew Zhou, and Matthew Driben; and 7th graders Chase DePue, Ian Rogers, Jaison Dasika, Amy Rogers, Joey Ambarian, and Colin Campbell.

The Berks Challenge then utilized electronic clickers to test the students through a series of rounds to narrow it down to the top four performing students. Our students overall did well with the following

exciting results — At the start of Round 1, there were 78 contestants representing 10 school districts. In Round 2, the 78 contestants were narrowed down to 40: with six of Wyo Area's 10 students making it this far! Wyomissing had three students represented in Rounds 3 and 4 and during the final round, with four students remaining in the competition, **Andrew Zhou** claimed fourth place, and **Sam Botterbusch** took first place! Both Andrew and Sam will compete in the state competition at Penn State at the end of April.

The You be the Chemist Challenge is an extremely positive experience in that it not only fosters interest in science, but also promotes good study habits. Students are learning, and are motivated with a healthy dose of competition. Based on the many smiles throughout the day, it was very clear that all 10 of the Wyo Area competitors had a great experience.

MATHCOUNTS

The Junior High Math Team consisting of Samuel Botterbusch, Tobias Walker, Matthew Driben, and Joseph Cullen won first place at the 31st annual regional MATHCOUNTS competition held February 1, 2014 at Penn State Berks. This marks the second year in a row the team won the championship. More than 130 students participated and the following students placed in the top 10 individual competition: Sam Botterbusch finished second; Chris Poon, third; Matt Driben fifth; and Tobias Walker, tenth. The team and Chris Poon will compete at the state competition in March 7-8 in Harrisburg.

STEM Design Challenge

This spring two fourth grade teams and a fifth grade team will put their creativity to use and enter the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) Design Challenge to be held at Berks County Intermediate Unit. The challenge for 2014 is to create an environmentally friendly people mover. This vehicle must be able to travel at least four feet across the table and must overcome at least one obstacle (hill, curves, landforms, etc.). Obstacles are to be chosen and designed by the team. As a component of the presentation, team members should be able to explain how their vehicle is environmentally friendly, discuss how many people could fit in their people mover, and describe the obstacle and how their vehicle will overcome it.

Each team consists of four students and will have two hours to complete their project using K'Nex kits and motors. The structure must use at least one motor and may contain up to 1,400 K'Nex pieces. Each team will need to supply the narrative form and a blueprint for the competition as well as prepare a presentation on their model explaining how they answered the challenge. Teams will be judged on their creativity, teamwork, challenge success, design, and presentation. Competing on the fourth grade teams, coached by Patricia Kane, are Elizabeth Harenza, Betsy Lucas, Ian Kim, Brandon Vargo, Portia Sockel, Katie Schadler, Madeleine Piersol, and Tyler Lentz. Aiden Mack and Michela Kohl are alternates. The fifth grade team, coached by Robin Kline and Rose Sneeringer, is dubbed the UnWRECables, and includes Zane Pennypacker, Emma Morris, Owen Jakubek, and Nina Botvin.





Kids Dig MINECRAFT Pilot Program at WREC

The Minecraft craze that is sweeping the country has arrived in the WREC Computer Lab! Minecraft, developed by Swedish video game developer Mojang, is a game where players mine materials, build structures and explore new worlds. Working with a group

of five sixth-grade students who are avid Minecrafters, technology support specialist Andrew Hoover and sixth-grade teacher Andrea Bensusan are teaming up to conduct a pilot program to explore educational applications of this popular game.

Using MinecraftEDU, an application developed by an international team of educators and programmers, Hoover set up a server and made the technology accessible for a "test run" by the WREC students in a Minecraft world. Bensusan saw an opportunity to extend the sixth grade Social Studies curriculum by having the students learn about the culture of the Maya, a topic covered during a unit on the early civilizations of Latin America. After talking with one of her students, Matt Seley, a Minecraft enthusiast, Seley's mother, Pam Seley, put Bensusan in touch with the American Museum of Natural History in New York City to learn more about their "Minecraft at the Museum" program.

The pilot program team of sixth graders Matt Seley, Jack Garapola, Tony Guiseppe, Weston Schaeffer, and Jonathan Kremer has enjoyed learning about the Aztec, Inca and Maya cultures and developing a Mayan region in their Minecraft world. After exploring Minecraft "biomes" to choose a region that geographically matched the area in Middle America where the Mayan people lived, they quickly jumped in to building Mayan village huts and temples modeled after Chichen Itza, farming foods (corn, beans, squash and avocados) that the Maya harvested, and "spawning" creatures like jaguars and turkeys that were native to the Yucatan peninsula.

Once the pilot program wraps up, Hoover and Bensusan are hoping to create a program of after-school and summer opportunities for students using MinecraftEDU.
