



Student Council Takes on Charitable Endeavors



The year 2012 is one of hopefulness and change—a year in which we feel we can all make a difference. That’s why the Wyomissing Area High School Student Council took on the huge task of holding Wyomissing’s first-ever mini-THON. Through this, the group knew it would be able to make a difference in the lives of children battling cancer, as well as their families.

THON originated at Penn State in 1973 as a 3-hour dance marathon. In the 39 years since its inception, it has grown to be the largest student-run philanthropy in the world. Now a 46-hour dance marathon, it raised just under \$10,000,000 last year alone. Every penny goes to support an organization called the Four Diamonds Fund, which helps to pay

for the costs relating to pediatric cancer, including among other things, health care, housing, and transportation. Many times, it meets the full financial need for a family, alleviating much stress and allowing the family to focus on simply getting better.

THON is a no-sitting, all-action dance marathon with plenty of entertainment and enjoyment for all participants. The Student Council’s interest in having a version of the exciting and worthy event was piqued by 15-year THON participant and performer, **Cara Wojciechowski**, a senior and council member. “THON is a huge event that means so much to so many people. I thought that having

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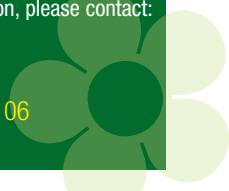
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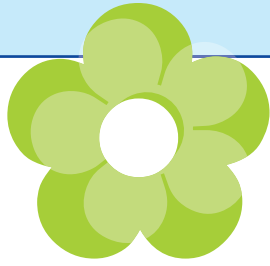

a mini-THON here at Wyo would be a great way to not only raise money and awareness, but to unite the school in working towards supporting a great cause,” said Cara. After bringing the idea to the attention of council members **Colleen O’Rourke** and president **Teddy Kolva**, advisors **Jennifer Mangold** and **Melissa Devlin**, and then to that of the entire council, the ideas that would eventually form into Wyo’s first-ever mini-THON were formed.

Knowing that planning the logistics of an event of this size would take hard work, the council began the process on the very first day of the new school year. Over the course of several months, times were arranged, schedules made, and anticipation and funds raised. Fundraising took many forms, such as sweet Halloween-themed messages called “Boo-grams” sent and received by students, chances to win prizes by making half-court shots at Spartan home basketball games, and an incredibly successful school-wide dodge ball tournament held in the new gym of the high school. Each endeavor raised money that went towards making the mini-THON a massive success.

The Wyomissing Area Student Council is pleased to report that from February 25 at 7 p.m. to February 26 at 7 a.m., more than 120 students participated in a 12-hour, non-stop, dance marathon for the purpose of raising money to aid families in their struggle against pediatric cancer.

It was a night filled with fun and activities geared to keeping the

students on their feet and standing up against cancer. Events included “Everybody’s Birthday Party,” piñata smashing, cupcake decorating, a talent show, a drum circle, a performance by a high school faculty band, casino and carnival games, Zumba, and gigantic beach volleyball.

Mangold and Devlin were thrilled to see such overwhelming community support for the event, which raised \$10,526.38! According to Mangold, ten percent of the funds came from the outstanding student-organized fundraisers, fifty percent came from dancers’ sponsorships, and an overwhelming number of donations and financial support came from local businesses and corporations. “From paper products to raffle prizes, the contributions of members of the greater Wyomissing community allowed our evening to be a great success,” she said.

Sophomore **Alex Potcovaru** may have said it best, “This was a night that will not be forgotten for a long time to come. Was it tiring for the dancers? Absolutely, but after meeting six different families affected by pediatric cancer, and hearing the words of a high school student from Berks Catholic who is a Four Diamonds “child” herself, the dancers could see that what they were doing was bigger than just staying up all night. They were doing something that would truly change lives. In the words of one of the Four Diamonds mothers who spoke at the beginning of the mini-THON, ‘It only takes one person to make a difference.’ In this case, there were more than 120 doing just that. And if

you ask any one of those people why they participated, the answer is simple: For the Kids.”

Letter from the Superintendent

Administrative Goals

During the fall of 2010 the Board of School Directors, in collaboration with the superintendent, developed a process for evaluating administrative performance. The process is referred to as the Total Rewards Plan or TRP for short.

The TRP is aligned with the mission statement, annual goals, and guiding assumptions of the Wyomissing Area School District, and the relationship between them is essential to the short- and long-term success of this plan and the participants. The objectives of the plan are to attract, retain, motivate, and reward the leadership team for their performance.

This performance-based compensation plan is based on three critical areas, all of which focus on student learning. The first, Position Performance, represents 50 percent of the potential performance compensation. Each year the administrator receives and updates his or her position description with a focus on the essential functions, which are the principle accountabilities and responsibilities of the position.

The second, Leadership Competencies, represents 25 percent of the potential performance compensation. Leadership competencies are divided into the following categories: Support for Learning, Organization, Planning, Communications, Cooperation, and Professionalism.

Support for Learning is defined as building and sustaining a clear vision for oneself and all stake-

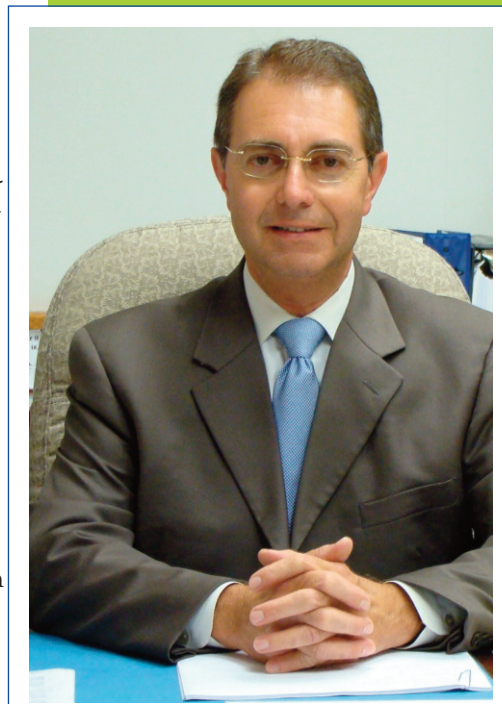
holders. The administrator demonstrates knowledge of educational or position-specific resources, maintains a safe and affirming climate, and promotes a sound instructional operational practice for the purpose of increased student achievement.

Organization and Planning are reflected through the selection of relevant goals for oneself and all stakeholders. The administrator evaluates available data and input to make informed decisions when establishing priorities in the planning process.

Communication and Cooperation are measured by the administrator's ability to communicate clearly and accurately, both orally and in writing. The administrator is proactive by keeping stakeholders involved and informed, and works with colleagues respectfully and constructively toward the mission and district goals. The administrator will maintain high staff morale and an overall supportive climate and environment.

The administrator will maintain a high level of Professionalism when making decisions and utilize relevant and appropriate input and data. He or she will model core values of honesty, integrity, trust, and decorum while reflecting on oneself and all stakeholders.

The third element in performance-based compensation is Goal Setting. Goals are valued at 25 percent of the potential performance compensation package. Each year the administrator iden-



tifies two goals. The goals are normally one team goal and one individual goal. Goals are typically short-term with a long-term impact on the district. Each goal has a value, not to exceed 25 percent.

The final performance rating falls into one of four levels:

- Commendable Performance—the administrator is highly effective and meets the essential functions and goals of his/her position with high quality and timeliness while showing initiative in taking on more than expected. Work is exemplary and his/her accomplishments make a systematic impact that enhances district performance and individual productivity.
- Proficient Performance—an administrator who is effective and meets his/her essential functions with quality and

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timeliness. This individual achieves results at the school level and makes contributions that add value to the school district and individual productivity.

- Basic Performance – an administrator who is developing and meeting his/her essential functions with some quality and timeliness, and demonstrates the potential to provide leadership at the professional level. It is expected this individual will set goals and identify strategies for increasing his/her performance to the proficient level.
- Unsatisfactory Performance – the administrator is ineffective and does not meet the essential functions of his or her position.

Only “Commendable” and “Proficient” individuals are eligible for any form of compensation increase. This plan was reviewed by all members of the administrative team and agreed upon as a fair and meaningful method for measuring and rewarding success as a leader in the Wyomissing Area School District.

A REMINDER TO RESIDENTS

YOUR LOCAL EARNED INCOME TAX RETURN FOR 2011 MUST BE FILED BY APRIL 17, 2012.

Anyone, regardless of age, who has earned income for the year 2011, must file a tax return if he or she lived in the Wyomissing Area School District. Even if your employer has withheld and paid your tax, this return must be completed. This obligation is incurred by anyone who is a wage earner, farmer, unincorporated business (including partnership and individual proprietorship) and all others who received earned income or profits for services rendered.

Failure to file on time will result in a penalty and interest charge of 12 percent per annum and additional costs of collection. Regulations also provide for a \$500 fine for refusal to file.

Residents of the Wyomissing Area School District are required to file a tax return, even if they have not received a form through the mail. Wyomissing Area Achieves AP District Honor Roll Status

For the second consecutive year, Wyomissing Area School District has been honored by the College Board by being placed on the AP Honor Roll. The District was selected because it has opened AP classroom doors to a significantly broader pool of students, while maintaining or improving the percentage of students earning scores of 3 or higher on AP Exams. According to the College Board's website, "Achieving both of these goals is the ideal scenario for a district's AP program because it indicates that the district is successfully identifying motivated, academically prepared students who are likely to benefit most from AP course work. The majority of U.S. colleges and universities grant college credit or advanced placement for a score of 3 or above on AP Exams."

The District is among 367 school districts across the U.S. and Canada that have achieved this status. Pennsylvania had the largest representation of districts on the list with a total of 34. Wyomissing Area is one of three Berks County districts listed,



but the only one to achieve the honor for the two consecutive years.

Corey Jones, principal of the Jr./Sr. High School, accepted the honor at a luncheon held in Baltimore, MD, in conjunction with the Middle States Advanced Placement Summit on January 25, 2012. "It was an honor for Wyomissing Area to be recognized by the College Board as an AP Honor Roll school at the AP Middle States Summit. Wyomissing was recognized along with top performing AP schools from New York, New Jersey, Maryland, Delaware, Pennsylvania, and the District of Columbia. This distinction is supportive evidence of our mission statement—that we continue to strive to provide all students with the opportunity to acquire the knowledge and skills they need to be successful in the 21st century."
