Remembering a Hero



Flannery Memorial Dedication Ceremony

On Saturday, September 10, 2011, hundreds from the Wyomissing community gathered to pay tribute to SSG. **Sean Flannery**, a 1999 graduate of the Wyomissing Area School District, who was killed in action by a roadside bomb in Afghanistan on November 22, 2010. Wyomissing Area's soccer field was named Flannery Field in honor of Sean, who was a star goalie for the Spartans.

Through generous donations from area businesses and private donors, a flagpole and monument have been erected to celebrate Sean's service and achievements. The memorial was the work of a committee of Wyomissing Area residents

A Look Inside Japanese Schools

Jr./Sr. High School Teacher Michael L. Miller selected for Fulbright Japan-U.S. Teacher Exchange Program for ESD

Last May, **Michael Miller**, art teacher at the Jr./Sr. High School traveled to San Francisco, CA, as a participant in the Japan-U.S. Teacher Exchange Program for Education for Sustainable Development (ESD), hosted by Fulbright Japan (Japan-U.S. Educational Commission). He was one of 48 teachers selected from across the nation for the program. The binationally fully-funded program for U.S. teachers took place in two parts: a Joint Conference with Japanese teachers in San Francisco, May 1-4, 2011, and a study tour to Japan, June 21-July 5, 2011. Focused on the theme of Education for Sustainable Development (ESD), the program's aim is to deepen mutual understanding and strengthen the relationship between Japan and the United States, as well as to raise awareness of ESD-oriented school programs and enhance ESDrelated curricula in both countries.

Miller began his Japanese trip in the city of Kobe, and following a two-day orientation, he traveled on to

Nagasaki Prefecture with a contingent of 16 American teachers. While in Nagasaki, he visited five schools. "Going into the Japanese schools was one of the most fascinating parts of the trip," says Miller. "One noticeable difference from American schools is Japanese students eat lunch in their homerooms (there is no cafeteria). The students are responsible for delivering and serving the food and cleaning up after the meal. Japanese students are also responsible for cleaning the school, sweeping and mopping floors, including lavatories. One Japanese teacher I met has a club where students will meet outside the school day to give extra time to clean areas of the school. You could see how this instilled a shared sense of pride and community in their school building."

Being in Nagasaki, Miller also had the opportunity to visit the site where the nuclear bomb was detonated on August 9, 1945, at 11:02 a.m. "We visited the Zero Marker, directly beneath where the bomb was detonated, the museum that documents and preserves artifacts



WEST READING ELEMENTARY CENTER

On the evening of Wednesday, October 12, the Wyomissing Area educational community gathered for the official West Reading Elementary Center Re-dedication Ceremony. Even though the building opened on time to begin the school year, this event signified the culmination of years of study and months of actual construction progress, resulting in our newly renovated building.

The event began with the fifth- and sixth-grade Spartan Singers presenting the national anthem. This was followed by speeches by WREC Principal Corbett Babb, Superintendent David Krem, Board President Michelle Davis, and Danielle Hoffer, vice president of Gilbert Architects Inc. The Board of School Directors then joined Director of Building and Grounds Craig Fries in the ribbon-cutting ceremony. Members of the community, as well as the many dignitaries attending, later participated in self-guided tours of the facility.

Last January, fifth- and sixth-grade students returned from winter break and

attended school at off-site locations for the remainder of the school year. The fifth grade was housed at St. James Church in West Reading. The sixth grade moved to Sts. Constantine and Helen Church, near Berks Catholic High School. This allowed facility-wide demolition, construction, and renovation to begin immediately, greatly improving the timeline for the return of students and staff.

Significant upgrades to the building include six additional classrooms, offices for the guidance counselor and RTII coordinator, a new conference room, and workspaces for services such as speech therapy and social work. Every learning space was completely remodeled and received significant instructional technology upgrades. Building-wide electrical, plumbing, HVAC, and technology system replacements were included in the overall project scope and will ensure an optimal educational environment for future generations of middle school students.

English teacher at the Jr./Sr. High School and cousin of Sean's late father, Michael, was also a member of the committee. Mark said, "It was heartwarming to see the response from the people of our community, as well as the people from Berks County. Actually, we even had people from various points across our nation making contributions for this memorial. Not only did we have a generous response from the citizens of our area, but many businesses contributed materials, labor, and other services to make this project a success."

On hand for the ceremony were local, county, and state dignitaries and clergy. Boy Scout Troop 413 raised the flag as the Wyomissing Area High School Camerata sang the national anthem. Sean's mother, Charlene "Charlie" Flannery, expressed her gratitude for the honor bestowed upon her son. A 21-gun salute and taps, played by the Topton American Legion Honor Guard closed the ceremony. Sean's brothers, Brian and Devin, participated in the soccer game that followed the dedication.

Mark Flannery shared his thoughts about the dedication ceremony. "It was beautiful. The sun was shining, the grass was green, and there was even a rainbow in the sky at the conclusion of the event. Flannery Field is a perfect way to honor the memory of Sean M. Flannery. He was an intelligent, compassionate, dedicated young man who died serving our country.







University with a major in special education N-12/elementary education K-6 and concentration in mentally/physically handicapped.



of the bombing, and the Peace Park, where many countries have contributed beautiful sculptures inspired by the theme of peace. The strong emotions of my own experience stood in contrast to the city bustling around me. There were many school groups visiting the site that day, and their excitement of just being out of school on a field trip at first surprised me. After thinking about it further, I realized our own students have the same attitude when visiting a place such as Gettysburg. Time can often diminish these emotions, especially with sites located close-by or those we may see each day."

While visiting Nagasaki, Miller lived with a Japanese family. "The home-stay was definitely my favorite part of the trip. This immersion in Japanese culture was far beyond what one would experience as a traditional tourist. As with most Japanese people I met on the trip, my hosts, the Yoshihara family, were very generous and welcoming, despite the difference of language. I spent time in the family's traditional tatami room sumi-painting with my

"host grandfather." What could be more traditional?"

Following the experience in Nagasaki, Miller returned to Kobe for a conference with the same Japanese teachers he met in San Francisco. As the outcome of this conference, he has entered into two collaborations with Japanese schools for the coming year.

The collaborations will involve both writing and art-making with students from both nations. "I look forward to sharing the results of these collaborations once completed," said Miller. "The projects will involve many students from our school and hundreds of students from different areas of Japan."
