Plans continue to move forward for the West Reading Elementary Center (WREC) project. As many of you are aware, the District will be renovating the existing building and replacing modular classrooms with an addition. School will continue as scheduled for students up until the winter break. Work is

scheduled to begin with asbestos abate-

ment on January 3, 2011.

WEST READING ELEMENTARY CENTER

From December 27 through December 31, 2010, classrooms will be moved to alternate locations. Starting January 3, the fifth grade will be housed for the remainder of the school year in the education wing of the St. James Church on Penn Avenue, West Reading. The sixth grade will hold classes in the education wing of the Sts. Constantine and Helen Greek Orthodox Church, near Holy Name High School.

As you can imagine, this is an enormous packing and moving project for the entire WREC faculty and staff. Boxes have already started to be piled into corners, a moving company has been contracted to relocate us and provide temporary storage, teachers have visited their "new" classrooms, and collectively we are all working to ensure that the "WREC Road Show" is a positive experience for our fifth- and sixth-grade students.

As the remainder of this first semester unfolds, please continue to check the district website for updates. There is a link on the main page - "WREC Project Update." Additionally, a group of dedicated parents have volunteered to participate on the WREC Parent Council for the 2010-11 school year. Their e-mail addresses are listed on the school site under "WREC Parent Council," and they are always a great source of information. I met with them on September 21, and much of our conversation centered on the upcoming move.

Finally, I'd like to extend an early "Thank You!" to all the parents, PTA members, Watchdog Dads, church volunteers, and community members who have already asked how they can help us work through the next several months. It is going to take huge effort from everyone, but I feel strongly that by working together, things are going to turn out just fine. After the completion of the project (hopefully in August 2011), we are going to have a great school building to come back to in West Reading.

WYO District Embraces Pennies for Peace



Jason Mai, 8, of West Reading, a third-grader at Wyomissing Hills Elementary School, dumps his bag of pennies into the Pennies for Peace jar in the school library. The school's students are collecting the pennies to help fund schools in remote areas of Pakistan and Afghanistan.

When the wives of General David Petraeus, commander of U.S. and NATO forces in Afghanistan, and Admiral Mike Mullen, chairman of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff, read the #1 New York Times bestseller Three Cups of Tea by Greg Mortenson and David Oliver Relin, the women told their husbands that they, too, needed to read the book. After doing so, General Petrais noted that it had three important points:

- We need to have respect and humility towards the citizens of Afghanistan and Pakistan; we are there to serve and help them.
- We need to listen more.
- We need to build relationships.

Greg Mortenson is now an advisor to both General Petraeus and Mike Mullen, and the book is required reading for senior military commanders. Three Cups of Tea tells the story of how, while hiking a mountain in Pakistan, Greg Mortenson became lost and very sick. Nursed back to health by the people of Korphe and touched by their kindness, he promised to repay them by building a

school. Today he has built more than 150 schools and increased the number of students in Pakistan and Afghanistan from 800,000 to 8,000,000. In a part of the world where children have so little access to schools and education, they also have little hope for a bright future. If a child feels his future is hopeless, he is more likely to join any group that will accept him, even one that promotes terrorism. In his book, Mortenson states, "If we try to resolve terrorism with military might and nothing else, then we will be no safer than we were before 9/11. If we truly want a legacy of peace for our children, we need to understand that this is a war that will ultimately be won with books, not with bombs."

Students in the Wyomissing Area School District are joining in Greg Mortenson's effort to bring education to this war-torn section of the world. During the 2010-11 school year, students will be collecting pennies, discussing Three Cups of Tea, which has been adapted to a picture book and young readers edition, and studying the cultures of Pakistan and Afghanistan, Additionally, they will be learning the invaluable lesson that they, too, can help change the world one penny at a time.



Commended students may be considered for corporate or college-sponsored scholarships but do not compete for National Merit Scholarships.

Bethany competed against hundreds of other students this past summer at HOSA's national convention in Orlando. HOSA is a national student organization endorsed by the U.S. Department of Education. HOSA's two-fold mission is to promote career opportunities in health care fields and to enhance the delivery of quality health care to all people.
