In the AFC, the Kansas City Chiefs are once again the favorite in the conference, but they are now joined by the Pittsburgh Steelers and the Buffalo Bills. The Chiefs are 8-1 but play the Las Vegas Raiders, their only loss, who are 6-3 and also contending

AFC East but the Miami Dolphins are right behind them at 6-3. The Pittsburgh Steelers

are the only undefeated team left in the NFL, sitting at 9-0 in the AFC North yet both the Ravens and Browns are in contention at 6-3. Right now, the AFC South is the only division that has two teams, both at the same record, fighting for the number one spot. The Colts and Titans are 6-3, while the Colts have the head to head advantage over the Titans after they dominated last

Thursday night, winning 34-17. The two teams face off in Week 12 with a division title on the line.

While we explore the NFC, there is a major Thursday Night Football game between the injury ridden Seattle Seahawks and the streaking Arizona Cardinals. The NFC West is currently in a three way race with the Seahawks (7-3) ahead after defeating the Cardinals (6-4) and Rams, who are 6-3. While the Seahawks appeared to be the favorite earlier in the season, it seems like both the Cardinals and the Rams have legitimate chances to steal the division from the Seahawks.

Heading to the NFC North, the Green Bay Packers are sitting atop first place with a record of 7-2 while the Chicago Bears are 5-5 and both the Minnesota Vikings and Detroit Lions are 4-5. It seems the Vikings are out of contention under .500, however they have a very easy schedule remaining and the Bears seemingly have no offense, thus giving Minnesota a chance to make the Wild Card. Down in the NFC South the New Orleans Saints are leading the division with a 7-2 record while the Tampa Bay Buccaneers are 7-3. The Saints currently have the head-to-head matchup advantage after they absolutely dismantled Tom Brady 38-3 two weeks ago. And of course, we have the putrid NFC East with no team above .500. The Philadelphia Eagles are currently the division leader... with a dismal record of 3-5-1. The New York Giants are 3-7 while the Washington Football Team and the Dallas Cowboys are both 2-7. Amazingly, all four teams have a legit shot to win this division and host a playoff game.

Although it is way too soon to predict the Super Bowl and awards, I'm going to predict the end of the season and all the way through the playoffs.

and provide them with equitable education opportunities,


time to check in our children and make sure that the world isn't getting to be too much for them—
